



January meetings were well attended despite the poor weather. Ian Carrol gave a most interesting insight into the Rotary Youth Leadership Award. His presentation showed the young people participating in exciting outdoor activities eg rock climbing, canoeing and raft building. Enjoyment was easy to spot on the young people's faces. This was all part of developing leaderships skills through teambuilding, communication, problem solving and decision-making. It was obvious that much work goes on by Rotary members in providing this great experience in Perthshire.

The Guild joined with the Men's Fellowship on 25 January for a taste of Burns on our Scottish Night. Entertainment was provided via a Tam O'Shanter DVD, the entertaining singing of Fraser Joyce and address to the Haggis and ladies by Allan Joyce in his usual humorous style. A reply from the ladies was most eloquently delivered by Maureen Dick. The evening concluded with Scottish fare - a Chapman's haggis pie, potato scones and shortbread.

February began with our Project Night, which this year is "Care for the Family". A most interesting presentation was made by Hannah Rankin from the Charity.



Care for the Family is a national charity which aims to promote strong family relationships and to help those who face family difficulties. The work is motivated by Christian compassion, with resources and support available to everyone, of any faith or none.

The cost of family breakdown is estimated at £42bn per year and mainly occurs during the early years of parenthood.

'Let's Stick Together' sessions, are specifically aimed at new mums and dads. The sessions introduce simple principles to highlight the skills which help facilitate a happy, healthy and lasting relationship, including bad habits to avoid, good habits to build, and the involvement of dads. The presentation was followed by a bring and buy sale. This along with the sale of books over the session and donations raised around £280 for the charity.

A small number of our Guild attended a National Guild Action Plan Roadshow held in Dalziel St Andrew's Church on Wednesday 3 February where we were able to give an input to the future of the Guild.

On 8 February the Guild were given an insight into the Society of Friends - the Quakers, via slides of the Quaker Tapestry. A most interesting talk was delivered by Alison Burnley who travelled from Edinburgh to talk to us. The following week the Rev Derek Pope was our speaker giving a talk on our theme. On 22 February members of Clincarthill Parish Church, beside Hampden Park, introduced us to the work of their Puppet Ministry. This was a most enjoyable and entertaining evening as they expressed faith and bible stories in an innovative way.

On Monday 29 February the ladies were entertained by Ladywell Primary School Choir, led and accompanied by Mr Stuart Colquhoun. This was a most enjoyable evening with a variety of hymns, Scottish songs and music provided by the brass ensemble. Following on our AGM was held, office bearers remain the same for the new session with a number of changes to the committee. Funds were also disbursed to our charity, the Tuesday Club, the Summer Club and the Junior Choir this year.

The Guild are looking forward to their outing this year which will take place to the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh followed by a high tea in Haddington on Saturday 14 May.

UPDATE

Christian Aid was founded 70 years ago to assist refugees and the displaced in Europe following the Second World War. Today, the organization is supporting those affected by war and violence in numerous countries, including Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan, South Sudan, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Colombia, providing practical assistance through local organizations embedded in their communities.

Act Alliance partners working on the refugee crisis in Europe include, in Greece, the organization International Orthodox Christian Charities which is providing food and non-food items, and improving conditions reception at centres, as well as undertaking water, sanitation hygiene (WASH) and activities on the islands of Chios. Samos, and Kos. The total number of refugees in Greece is now more than 160,000.

In Hungary, Hungarian Interchurch Aid is providing refugees on the border with non-food items, and has to date helped more than 5,500 people.

Ιn Philanthropy, Serbia. the charitable foundation of the Serbian Orthodox Church, is providing food, hygiene and baby kits, shelter and containers. plus sanitary (firewood, 'winterisation' supplies clothes and boots), and psychosocial support. It is helping an estimated 1,000 refugees a day.

During Christian Aid Week this year (15-21 May) we will be hoping for the same strong support for the House-to-House collection that we've had recently. If you can spare one evening during the week, please join our team of collectors.
