#### Remembrance Sunday

To see so many of our Youth Organisations on Parade and to welcome many of their family and parents to Church was so heartwarming.

#### Advent And Christmas

Like Remembrance Sunday, Advent and Christmas is also a time when people of all ages turn to the Church - seeking something of the Hope, Peace, Joy and Love of Christ the Saviour.

This Christmas looks like being the first 'normal' Church Christmas since 2019 and we have some wonderful services and events planned.

The Boy's Brigade Christmas Fayre is being held on Saturday 3 December and it looks to be extra special this year.

Please note that the Services on Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Epiphany Sunday will be shorter in nature and are open to all ages in the congregation. If you are coming on Christmas Morning, please bring one of your presents with you so we can show one another what we got,

As well as our Christmas Services, we will also hold our annual Outdoor Carol Singing by Firelight in the Church Garden on Sunday 11 December - 6 pm. This will be followed by refreshments in the Church Sanctuary and the much-loved Y-Zone Panto.

With the cost-of-living crisis affecting so many of us this year, Christmas and New Year may involve tightening the purse strings. Maybe less gifts and treats await. The Christmas Message will remain unchanged though. Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus, the baby of Bethlehem, was born in an animal outhouse, to poor parents being pushed around by an officious government. Soon after, they were forced to flee Israel for Egypt - seeking refugee status - as King Herod sought to kill the baby Jesus. Herod saw this new born baby as a threat to his power and his throne. Christmas is not about riches but is Good News to the poor and to all; it is a time of hope and joy filled with the promise of peace, love and justice.

As the Prophet Isaiah says: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness - on them light has shined...for a Child has been born for us, a Son given to us; authority rests on His shoulders, and He is named: Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Great will be His authority, and there shall be endless peace for the throne of David and his Kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onward and forevermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this." [ISAIAH 9:2 & 6-7]

#### The Presbytery Plan


The Presbytery Plan for our new Presbytery Forth Valley and Clydesdale lies in temporary suspension following the resignation en-masse of the Presbytery Planning Team at the October Meeting of Presbytery. The team's attempts at a 'Draft Plan' was, in large parts, a threat to the future of the Church in our locality. The abuse that individual team members received. however. completely was unacceptable. Our thoughts and prayers should be with those who feel hurt and broken at this time. Debate in the Church should always be civil and carried out in the right place and at the right time.

A new Presbytery Planning Team has been nominated to carry on the job of Presbytery Planning into the New Year. The original deadline [set by the National Church] of December 31<sup>st</sup> 2022 is going to be far exceeded.

I was on the Presbytery Committee electing the new Presbytery Planning Team. It is no secret, or surprise, that few people wanted to serve on the new committee - especially amongst Ministers. Disagreements with the premise of the whole planning process and fear of being abused [like the former team] automatically eliminated almost everyone we asked. We are fortunate, though, to have the help of an experienced retired Minister from Glasgow Presbytery and the use of 2 full-time Interim Ministers from the National Church's Faith and Nurture Committee. Please pray for this new team as they begin their work in earnest. May God guide them along the right paths.

#### FINANCE REPORT TO END OF OCTOBER 2022

Our financial year closes on 31 December and at that time we are predicting a deficit of  $\pm$ 10,000 on our accounts.

While giving has increased over 2022 compared to the same period in 2021, expenditure has grown by a huge amount mainly due to an increase in payments to the Presbytery and to the Church of Scotland via Mission and Ministry payments.

Last year we paid Presbytery dues of £1,437 compared to £3,245 this year. Last year Ministry and Mission was £82,000 compared to £91,000 this year.

Other expenditure in gas and electricity has also gone up compared to last year. However, although gas and electricity prices have increased dramatically, the Church is currently on a very good fixed rate at a fraction of the price currently on offer and this lasts until at least October 2023. What happens after that is anyone's guess.

As I have said above, giving, through envelopes and Standing Order, has increased by 2% compared to 2021. In raw terms £99,000 compared to £97,216 in 2021.

At this point in time a deficit of  $\pounds$ 10,000, although very disappointing, is not catastrophic. However, if deficits of this size were to become the norm then financial worries would surface and this could prevent us fulfilling all of our financial commitments.

What can be done to help our financial position. A Sunday morning change initiated today, at the Remembrance Service, was the collection of envelopes and Open Plate during the service. One loss in our income has been the almost non-existent amount of Open Plate during the pandemic up to this date. Over a year we normally have around £6,000 in Open Plate giving but in recent years we have had nothing like that. Consequently, we are down approximately £5,000 this year and the tax recovered on that amount of £1,250.

Everyone is feeling the financial pressure of a society that is struggling to pay bills, buy food and heat homes. Businesses and Organisations have also been hit and our Church is no different. All I can do is ask you to consider increasing what you give to the Church if you are able to afford an increase at this time. The re-instatement of Open Plate giving will help and the very busy Christmas period will also help.

The story told of their betraval, capture, and imprisonment in concentration camps where they were subjected, like so many others,

to brutal and inhumane treatment. Corrie's story went on to tell of the death of family members and her lucky escape and survival. She went on to become a Christian writer, with some of her books being made into films and she died in America on April 15<sup>th</sup>, 1983, aged 91.

# UPDATE

Christian Aid's work continues with its ongoing development programmes, its campaigns for justice and its response to emergencies.

The emergencies include the humanitarian need caused by the Russian military offensive against Ukraine.

Christian Aid was founded in 1945 by British and Irish churches to help refugees after the Second World War. Back then, they worked with partner churches to alleviate suffering by raising the equivalent of £3 million plus in today's money. They supported, equipped and enabled partner churches in mainland Europe to provide what people needed. Nearly 80 years later, they are doing the same.

Since the Russian Federation launched a military offensive against Ukraine on 24 February 2022, over 5.2 million people have fled their homes to escape conflict in Ukraine. At least 2,435 civilians have been killed and 2,946 injured. This is the fastest growing refugee crisis since World War II.

Christian Aid is working with 3 partner organisations in the ACT Alliance:

- Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA) in Ukraine and Hungary
- the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) in Poland

• Swiss Church Aid (HEKS) in Ukraine, Hungary and Romania, to offer assistance to internally displaced peoples and to refugees

So far, HIA have reached 26,187 people with lifesaving aid, shelter, truckloads of food (345 metric tons), water, sanitation and health support, as well as offering vital information for refugees and internally displaced people.

Through the DEC emergency appeal, Christian Aid has donated £1 million for trauma first aid kits and £1 million for urgently needed medical and pharmaceutical equipment, items and supplies, for Ukraine, through their partner Crown Agents. Their partner is working directly with Ukraine's Ministry of Health to supply these kits to those caught up in the fighting.

The situation in Ukraine makes other crises worse by causing global food prices to rocket. In East Africa, for example, millions of innocent children, women and men are taking desperate measures to survive in the faced of extreme hunger, caused by failed harvests, livestock deaths and water shortages. The severe conditions are being made worse by the climate crisis and the COVID-19 pandemic. Now, the increase in global food prices has turned a tough situation into a dire crisis.

Please continue to help Christian Ai through your donations and prayers.

# WRAP UP LANARKSHIRE

'Wrap Up' is a Rotary project, working in partnership with the registered charity 'Hands on London'.

'Wrap Up Lanarkshire' started in 2021, initiated by the Rotary Club of Motherwell and Wishaw. The Club presented the idea of 'Wrap Up' to other Rotary Clubs in North and South Lanarkshire, resulting in 8 Rotary Clubs forming 'Wrap Up Lanarkshire'

The project's aim is to provide warm coats/jackets for the homeless or people in need.

At the beginning of October, Rotary Clubs in Lanarkshire placed specially designed boxes in various locations such as churches/chapels and schools. People were asked to deposit coats and jackets into the boxes. Rotarians emptied the boxes at regular intervals throughout October and took the contents to one of 3 central locations in Lanarkshire, where they examined the items for quality and cleanliness before sorting them into various categories.

Motherwell and Wishaw Rotary teamed up with Hamilton Rotary and Strathaven Rotary to carry out the sorting process in an area of the stadium generously supplied by Hamilton Accies Football Club.

During the month of November, the coats/jackets are being distributed via homeless shelters, refugee centres, organisations supporting the elderly, women's refuges, children's centres and other charities helping people in crisis. This year 1,200 coats/jackets have been distributed from the Hamilton Accies sorting location, with more still to be distributed. This will hopefully include Ukrainian refugees living on a ship moored on the River Clyde at Glasgow.

This year, the generosity and concern for those in need was very evident in our own church of St Mary's, where the members donated the very impressive total of 153 quality coats/jackets.

On behalf of the Rotary Club of Motherwell and Wishaw, a sincere thank you to everyone who donated coats/jackets.
