Dear Friends

We've been looking back a great deal these days, across a hundred years and more, to the beginnings of our church; there has been a keen interest shown in the people and events with a place in the story of our congregation across its first century.

1914 was a momentous year; the campaign for Women's Suffrage was driving forward; there was industrial unrest, with 2 million on strike across the country in June; Irish Home Rule was high on the political agenda. Then in August, German forces invaded Belgium, and Britain, with its allies was thrust into what was known, for a time, as the Great War, to be "over by Christmas" they said; the "war to end all wars", they said; sadly, ironically within 20 years to be known as the First World War. This year we "commemorate" (what is the right word?) the outbreak of the First World War, with regret, with penitence, and with thanksgiving for sacrifices made, in that grim period of our nation's history.

It is perhaps remarkable that in the midst of the upheaval of 1914, a small congregation in Motherwell was planning and designing and constructing a new place of worship. At a time when so many of the big issues of the day were placed in abeyance until the war was over, in faith and hope, our fathers and mothers in the faith determinedly went ahead with the building of our fine sanctuary, and largely

paid for it - at a time when I'm told, income tax was doubled to meet the war effort.

We're now rapidly approaching the climax of celebrations in November and December. During the summer months things have quietened down a little - but of great interest has been the "Open Church" and the invitation to our own members, and others to view the exhibition telling our church's story, in words and pictures and photographs, and through the architecture and furnishings. Many of our own folk and their families and friends, from the town and beyond, and quite a number of former members have visited St Mary's and enjoyed a guided tour, found their names in the Baptismal Roll, seen familiar faces on the video screen, and shared a cup of coffee and home-baking in the Coffee Bar, and a range of reminiscences!

Our thanks are due to Bill Simpson and the Centenary Action Team who organised these Wednesday events, and to Allan Joyce who gathered and assembled the display, in particular, the video which ran and ran again, showing many of the people who have been St Mary's across the years, this has had huge interest and appeal.

Bill and Allan were almost constantly present week by week supported by teams of elders and others who staffed the Coffee Bar, providing drinks and baking. Thanks to all!

We've been looking back - and rightly so, with gratitude. But we are looking forward too - to our Centenary Songs of Praise, to the visit of Rev John Harris, who will preach at our Communion Service in September, and to our Centenary Harvest Lunch at the start of October and beyond, to the climax of our celebrations in November and December, to the Centenary Dinner, to the Centenary Service, and to the visit of the Right Reverend John Chalmers, Moderator of the General Assembly on 14th December. John will preach at a Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication. I am not sure that a serving Moderator has been in our pulpit before - a first, I think! We shall celebrate at that service the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

And we look forward to the life of our congregation beyond Centenary. In the autumn, we will rejoice in the Ordination of a number of new elders who will join our Kirk Session, and play that special role in the work and witness of St Mary's in its second century.

At the last meeting of the Kirk Session, we appointed, to a new role in our congregation, Stewart Maxwell, as Depute Session Clerk. As a number of congregations have, in recent years, we recognised the need to support the Clerk, Allan Joyce, in what is a demanding position in the church and the need for continuity in the face of changing circumstances in the life of the congregation. Stewart has been very deeply and committedly involved in St Mary's, from boyhood. He is currently our Boys' Brigade Captain, and there, as in many other areas of our organisations and activities, he has served with effectiveness and dedication. I am sure he will have the support of the Kirk Session and congregation as he takes on this new

responsibility. We wish him many blessings in it.


So let's continue our celebrations, in this special year. Looking back with great gratitude and forward with high hopes, let's celebrate here and now the remarkable story of our church, the faith we share as God's people in this place, the fellowship we enjoy as a congregation. Let's give thanks for a century's songs of praise offered, for a century's service given, in parish and community.

And as we celebrate, let us dedicate ourselves to writing the continuing story of St Mary's in worship and service. As our fathers and mothers in the faith built for the future, let us look to our second century, in that same faith, and move forward with renewed vision and commitment to serving the unfolding purpose of God in the days ahead, with our hope founded on Christ, the same, yesterday, today and forever.

May we all know God's richest blessing in these days.



1914 CENTENARY UPDATE 2014

Baptismal Records dating back to 1902, the Register of Banns, fascinating details of all those from St Mary's who sacrificed their lives in the first and second world wars, memorabilia from the Guiding Movement, and the Boys Brigade, a photographic display capturing many Sunday School trips (with 6 ... yes 6 double decker buses) congregational concerts and much more. Summer Camp 2014



Camp 2014 was the eagerly awaited return to Badaguish Outdoor Centre, near Aviemore in the Cairngorms. We have been going to Badaguish on and off for many years but after 2 years away trying other places we had concluded that nowhere else could beat it as a venue for camp.

Getting there....Day 1

The now extended convoy of 3 minibuses, the Chapman's Landover and trailer and a couple of officers cars managed to load up and ship out all 33 boys, 14 staff and all our camping stuff and luggage for 5 days of adventure.

After a lunch stop in Aviemore we descended on Badaguish and began the process of making ourselves at home - 12 tents had to go up, the flag pole erected, the kitchen had to be organised, 12 months of dust washed from our travelling crockery and utensils, the mammoth online shop had to be unpacked, the tuck shop organised and the all-important satellite dish set up and tuned in.

At Badaguish we have a great set-up that gives us best of both worlds - plenty of flat dry camping ground complemented by indoor cooking and dining facilities and a modern toilet/shower block.

After an afternoon setting up and settling in we enjoyed our first meal together and then set off for a stroll down to Loch Morlich. We had only just skimmed the first few stones on the loch when the midge population started to sharpen their teeth and we beat a hasty retreat to the campsite for supper!

The Dreaded Hillwalk....Day 2

Sunday is the traditional camp hillwalk and this year we tackled an old favourite - the Meall a' Bhuachaille loop. This lets us walk from the campsite in a big loop taking in 3 big peaks (the biggest being 810 metres) and taking in some fabulous sights in the process. Activity Days....Day 3 & 4

Monday and Tuesday were both days of organised activities where the main event of the day was provided by an outdoor activity company. The 2 activities were kayaking and mountain biking.

The Kayaking took place on the Craggan Outdoors pond and what initially looked like a tame activity turned into a really fun session paddling on the pond, playing impossible kayaking games, launching the kayaks off a ski ramp and trying (and failing) to avoid getting wet. The seniors in particular had a comical session in glorious sunshine where at one point everyone was in the water and all the kayaks were submerged. Even the officers got in on the action - giving the boys their first target for a soaking!

The mountain biking took place in the hills and tracks around Granton on Spey and based on the stories and video footage looks like it was a white knuckle ride in places!

What else....?

In between all the planned activities the boys were kept entertained/busy by our staff team in World Cup football competitions, tennis games, a quiz night and a big game of baseball on Loch Morlich beach.

When time permitted we even managed to watch the odd game of football from the World Cup in Brazil, courtesy of our satellite dish and big screen!

Parents' night

The 2013/2014 session of the Junior section session came to a close in May at our annual parent's night. This year the parent's night involved the boys recreating what a typical Wednesday night might involve. The First Years demonstrated one of our physical activity games; while the Second Years revealed the appeal of our mysterious 'Bring Me' game and finally the Third Years showed what squad inspection consists of. The boys are to be highly commended for doing an excellent job in showing their families both the traditional practices and the more changeable, current activities that take place within Junior Section.

The Parent's night also provided the opportunity for all of the boys to receive their relevant badges in recognition of their hard work throughout the session on the Junior Section achievement programme.

We are very fortunate in Junior Section to have a high calibre of boys within our section. However, it does mean that the officers each year face a near impossible task of determining which boys should receive recognition with our individual awards. This year after much debate, deliberation and discussion the recipients for our individual prizes were decided. These prizes were awarded throughout the course of the parent's night and are also detailed below.

Best in Year

One of the ways we acknowledge individual merit is by selecting a 'Best in Year' for each of the 3 year groups. This year these prizes were awarded as follows:

- 1st Year- Ross Andrew**
- 2nd Year- Andrew Gardiner**
- 3rd Year- Cameron Gunn**

These 3 boys consistently demonstrated excellent manners; commitment to the Boys Brigade and enthusiasm for the various activities and events that were undertaken throughout the year.

Inspection Results

Throughout the session the boys undergo a weekly inspection in which points are awarded for each individual aspect of their uniform (jumper, armband, trousers, shoes), clean hands and face, attendance at Church/Sunday school and behaviour. The weekly scores were collated and the results were very close indeed, with decimal points separating the top awards. There were 2 runners up positions and the boy with the highest score was awarded the coveted **BBig Cheese Award**.

The results were:

- Runners Up - Nathan Bradshaw and Oliver Fry**
- BBig Cheese Award - Evan Pattison**

In addition there was also a best squad, based on inspection points. This year the **Best Squad** was **Squad 5**.

Sportsman and Leading Boy

We also had an award for **Best Sportsman** which this year went to **Robbie Welsh**, one of our third years. He has been a crucial member of our battalion competitions throughout his years at Junior Section and I am sure he will have many battalion competitions ahead of him at Company section!

Our newest award is the **Leading Boy trophy** which is designed to acknowledge the important role our squad leading boys play within the Junior Section. Leading boys are third years who have been selected by the officers to be responsible for 'leading' their squad. This means ensuring that their squads are well behaved during the opening and closing services and supporting younger members of the section throughout the night. The officers this year have been particularly impressed by the leadership and gentle encouragement that many of our leading boys have provided. Endeavour Shield

Our most sought after individual award is the **Endeavour Shield**. The Prayer Shawl Ministry NEEDS YOU!!!


Throughout the ages shawls have symbolized shelter, peace, and can give physical and spiritual comfort in times of stress, loss or illness. Like the Jewish Tallit, traditionally worn by Jewish males, wrapping yourself in the Prayer Shawl can create a personal space.

Since the idea of a Prayer Shawl Ministry was born some 16 years ago in the USA, the ministry has spread across the world. Compassion and the love of knitting and crocheting have been combined into a prayerful ministry which reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace, as well as in celebration and joy. The shawls are meant to serve as mantles of God's gentle love and blessings and the hope is that, as the recipients wear their shawls, they will be enfolded in warmth, peace, strength and comfort.

A number of Guilds in Hamilton Presbytery share in a local Prayer Shawl Ministry, and over the past year it has become apparent there is a great need for shawls. Knitted squares have also been given to men within the Presbytery as they are more convenient.

So far we have distributed some 25 shawls and squares, one even ending up as far afield as Singapore. From comments from the recipients, the shawls and squares have given much comfort. Although the shawls and squares are tangible expressions of the giver's thoughts, it is rather the prayerful thoughts behind the gift that has the meaning. When completed each shawl and square is dedicated before being sent on its way. The creation and presentation of a prayer shawl, like all acts of generosity, enriches the giver as well as the recipient.
