Dear Friends,

As I write this - to meet Isabel's deadline! - I am very conscious of the continuing conflict between Hamas and Israel, as the casualties mount up, increasing numbers of innocents become victims, and neither side is prepared to make even the smallest compromise for the sake of peace. We are living in very distressing and frightening times.

And it is this world setting of violence and uncertainty that we find ourselves at Advent, preparing to celebrate the birth of the Christ Child - the one who came as the hope of the world, with the message of peace, goodwill, love and joy. Yet the world is riven, not with angels singing "Glory to God in the highest", but with clamour of war, the rhetoric of hate, and the sound of countless modern Rachels, weeping for their children.

It is in this setting that we have to declare that, despite all that seems to the contrary, God is with us. The word "Immanuel", one of the titles of Jesus, means just that - God is with us. Even when it seems to us that he is not there, he is, and always will be, and that is his promise to us, a promise fulfilled in the birth of Jesus.

As we progress through Advent we shall light a new candle every Sunday - a reminder that Christ is the Light of the World - each candle representing a

great theme - Hope, Peace, Joy, Love - reminders to all of us that Jesus is the hope of the world, that he is the Prince of Peace, that his coming brings great joy and that the gospel - the Good News - which he preached and lived out, is centred and grounded in love.

On the first Sunday in Advent, when the church shall resound to the great hymn "O come, O come, Emmanuel" we shall be reminding everyone that God is with us, and that is why we are filled with hope, praying for peace, sharing the joy of Christmas and celebrating the wonder that is the love that came down at Christmas.

Elsewhere in the magazine you will find a message from Bryce who has started his new treatment. Bryce, we all wish you every blessing and every success with this latest treatment, and we want you and Helen to know that both of you, and the family, are kept in our thoughts and prayers.

I would like to offer my thanks to Arthur, and to the team of elders, for their assistance, which is much appreciated, and for the variety of gifts and skills, and approaches to worship - we are indeed blessed at St Mary's.

As we celebrate Christmas and move on into a new year may I thank all of you for all your efforts during 2023, and I wish you every blessing for 2024.

One of the things that I personally have found sustaining and invaluable is the regular Live Broadcasts of our Sunday Services. It is not quite the same as being in Church in person, but it is certainly the next best thing. Tuning in each week, I find myself able to worship as part of my wonderful Church Family. ## Finance Report to 31st October 2023

Our finances are not in as good a position as previous years. We will have a sizeable deficit in both our Congregation Account and our Fabric Account at the end of the financial year and if the current level of income continues, as now, then this could lead to further problems further down the line and necessitate the transfer of funds out of our Reserves to cover the shortfalls. Our income through giving is 3.5% down and our expenditure is increasing.

On 1 October our electricity agreement ended to be replaced by an agreement which doubles the price of this fuel. In addition, our gas agreement terminates on 1 April 2024 and almost certainly will double our costs. Furthermore, we have been instructed that we must eradicate a number of structural problems in the upper hall and add fire doors throughout the buildings at huge cost.

If you give through Standing Order it is easy to forget to reassess what you give on a yearly basis. Gift Aid is also something that should be considered as it gives us extra money donated from the Government for little effort. If you are a tax payer all you need to do is fill in a form and we do the rest. Forms can be had at the Church office. Once completed we can then claim back, from the Government, 25% of everything you give.

At present we have over 500 members. However, from our statistics over a number of years only 250 attend church on a regular basis or contribute to the upkeep of the church.

## MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

On 2 October, the Fellowship got off to an excellent start, when an almost full complement of members met back in the Conference Room where our Honorary Vice President Rev Arthur Barrie was the speaker. His history lesson on the birth and growth of Parliament, was much appreciated by all present. As ever Arthur's talk, while imparting knowledge, was laced with humour and in places expressing his views on past and present political leaders. A great start to the Session.

16 October: - and Iain Neilson, of MAF Mission Aviation Fellowship spoke of the work of this Christian based fellowship flying single engine aircraft into countries all-round the globe. Flights involving delivering needed supplies and medication into difficult to reach communities and areas of conflict. Iain informed that MAF is the biggest private airline in the world and private individuals could book flights to its various destinations. While companies, hospitals and commercial enterprises pay for their service the bulk of the finance required is raised from charitable donations and Iain had a variety of items on sale to support the Mission.

30 October : - Was a night of nostalgia for members as BB Captain Stewart Maxwell, accompanied by past captains Ian Carrol and Ian Beattie, with apologies from Alan Brown and Stuart Dick, discussed the 140 years history of the BB. Stewart rehearsed the history of the movement from its early birth from a Glasgow Sunday School and the vision of the founder William Smith to the worldwide organisation it is today. Each of the captains gave an insight into the everyday running of the 13<sup>th</sup> Company, the highlights of camps and the development of boys over their growth through the badge schemes and participation in the D of E scheme.

The discussion over tea and coffee gave members a chance to reminisce on their time in the BB.

# Junior Church

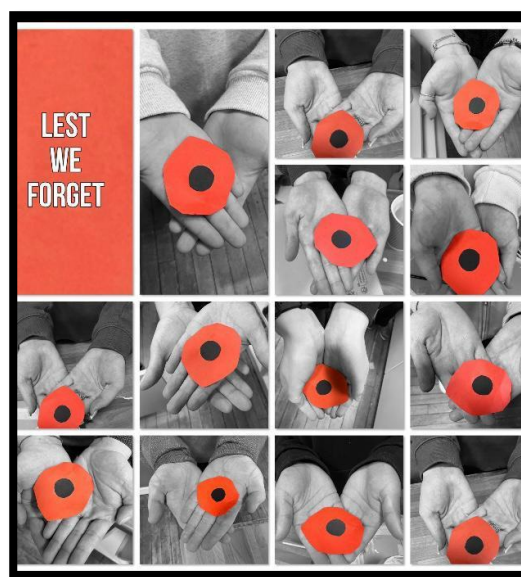
